High Expectations

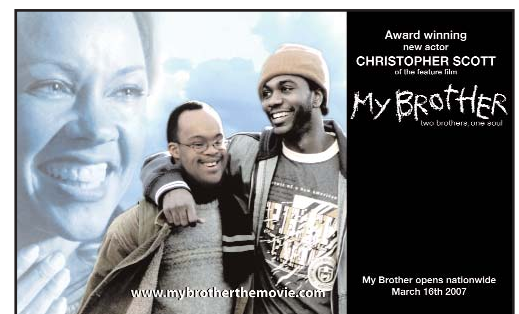
In looking for a story to introduce the theme of this

newsletter I came across this short tale. One day a partially deaf boy came home from school with a note from the teacher. It suggested that the boy's parents take him out of school. The note said that the boy was "unable to learn." When the boy's mother read the note, she said, "my son Tom is 'unable to learn.' If the people at school won't believe in him, I will. I will teach him myself." And so she did. Many years later, when Tom died, the people of our nation paid tribute to him by turning off every light at the same time, for a full minute. In the darkness, they took a moment to appreciate the man who not only invented the light bulb, but also the first music recording devices and the first motion pictures. Thomas Edison has over a thousand patents to his credit.

The connection between Thomas Edison and Rise goes beyond my original thought on the importance of belief in human capacity and the role of high expectations. The story also reminds us of how today's accomplishments impact the future. As we look at the accomplishments of Christopher Scott, one of Rise's most enthusiastic employees, we also understand how the expectations of one young man's mother could give birth to the motion picture and music industries. I hope you

will read all of this Spring newsletter to see how the unexpected interaction between the Rise School and those two worlds play out in the coming weeks.

In mid-March, Christopher Scott, teaching assistant in the red room, will sit in the AMC Studio 30 movie theater on Dunvale, and watch himself on the big screen. Not unlike many Hollywood hopefuls, it has been a long road to stardom for Chris, and not everyone would have expected this moment. Chris was born in the late 1970's with Down syndrome. His mom, Brenda relates the under-whelming expectations of the doctors at the time. "They said we should not expect him to advance beyond a three year old level." But the people in Chris' life embraced expectations much higher than that. At the school Chris more than fulfills those expectations in his daily work.

Had expectations not been high, Rise director Jan Stailey, would not have forwarded the email to Chris' parents from the Down Syndrome association asking for help in finding a person to play the role of James, an adult Down syndrome male, in what was to become the movie "My Brother." Had Chris' mom not shared those high expectations she would have never worked with Chris to put together an audition video.

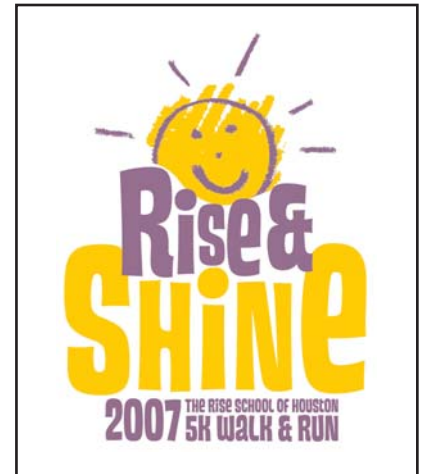
Even when he landed the role, expectations were raised. When he arrived on the set the script was adjusted to give him more speaking lines than the screenwriters originally felt an actor with Down syndrome could handle. In the end, the message in 'My Brother' has played out in Chris' life. Don't ever underestimate the capacity of each human being, regardless of their age or challenge.

At Rise we have great expectations. Those expectations focus on our children, but extend through staff and beyond to our supporters and our community. We continue to discover that for those who believe, much is given. As 2007 unfolds our expectations are great. We hope you will all join us in another great year at Rise! ☀️

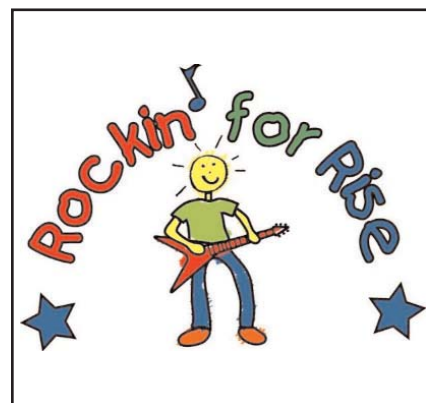
